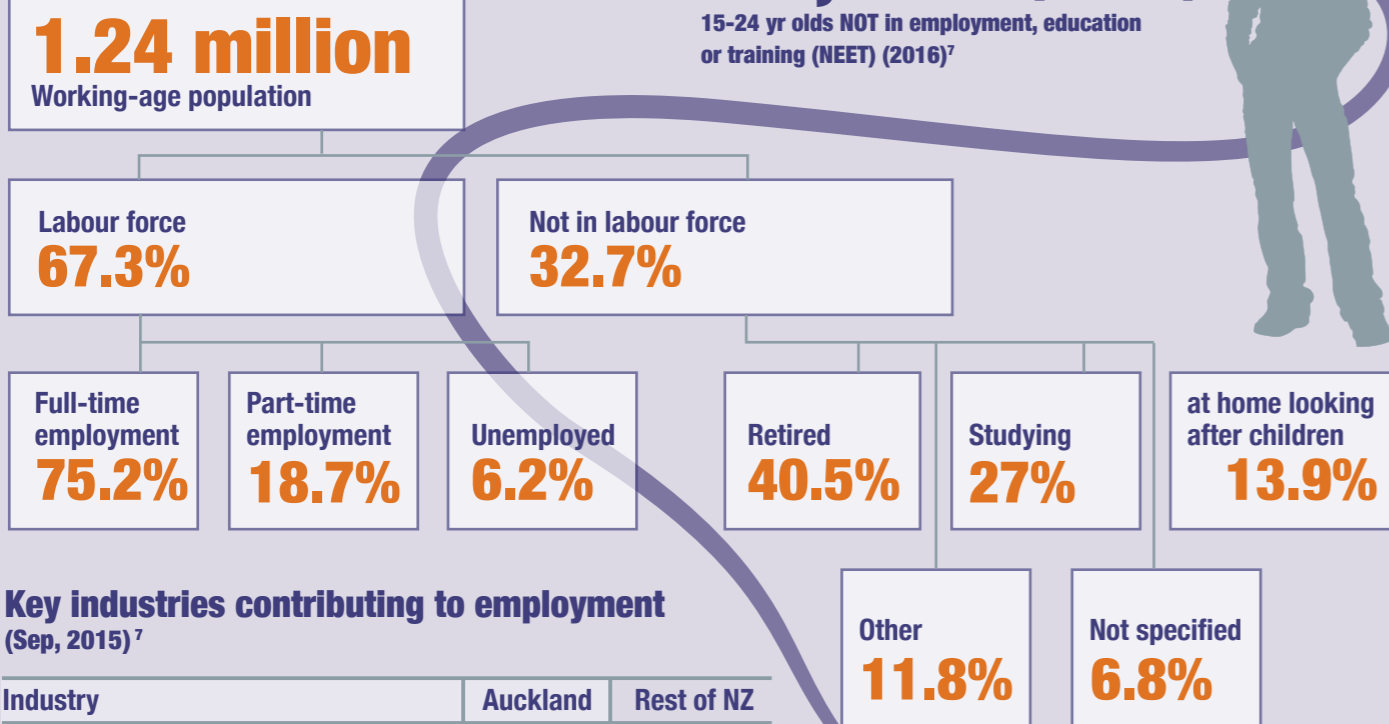

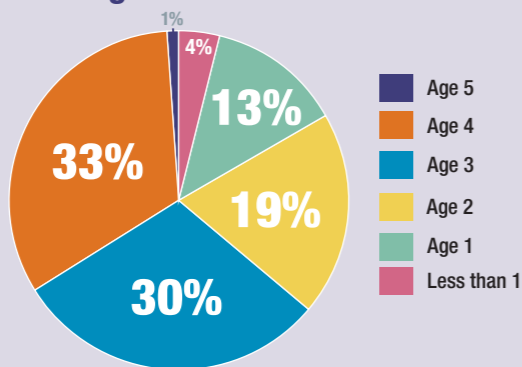

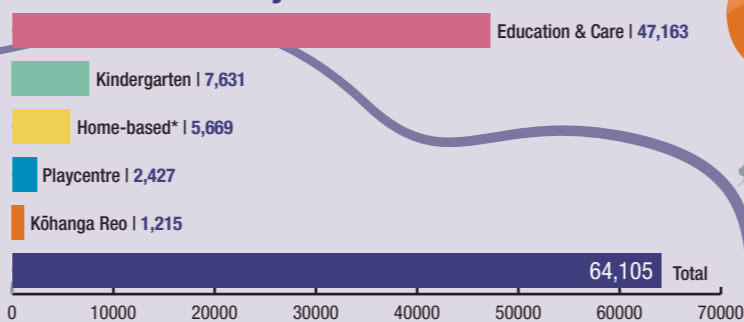
Children aged 0-4 yrs in 2013³

ECE enrolments by age in 2014⁴

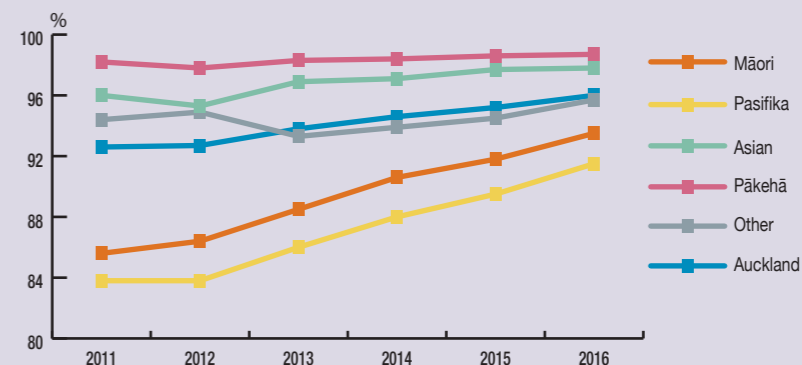


ECE enrolments by service in 2014⁴

Children starting school who attended ECE⁴

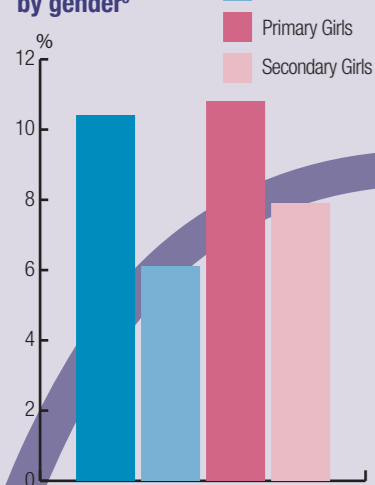

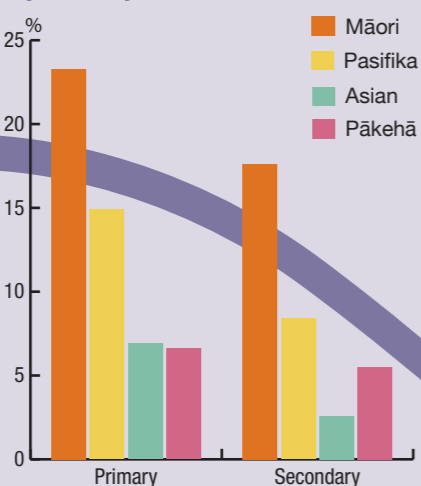

Transience by gender⁵

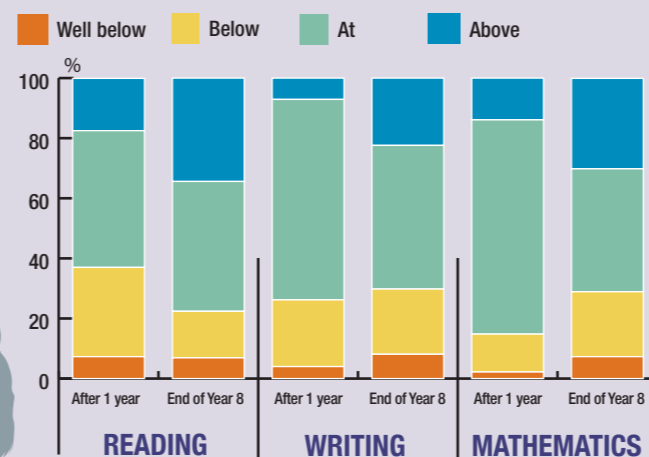


Transience by ethnicity⁵

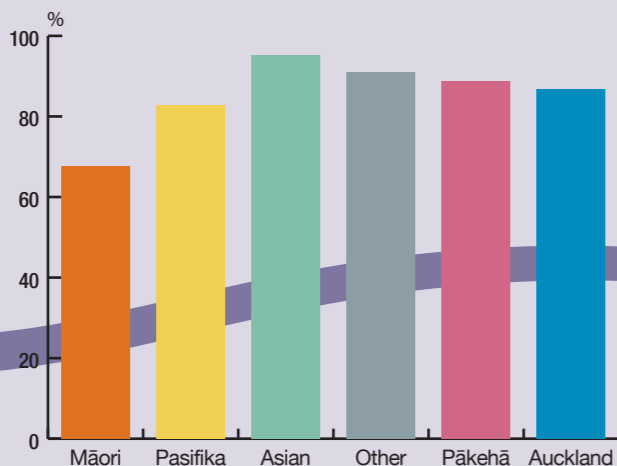

Percentage of school leavers staying at school until 17 (2015)⁴



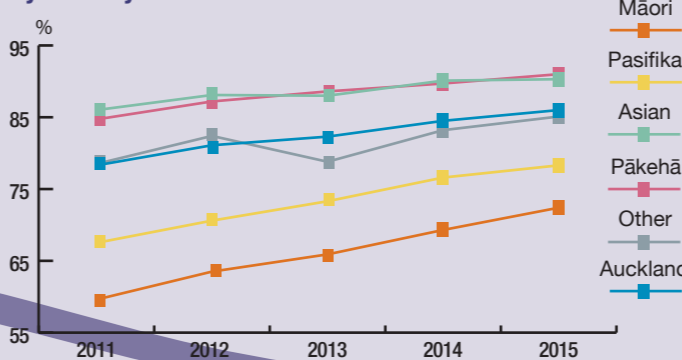
